## THE GRAND LODGE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA





In the span of two weeks at the end of May, Oklahoma was hit by a series of tornadoes from Carney and Little Axe, to Moore, to El Reno, and beyond. I became almost numbed by the constant weather alarms ringing in my home, wondering who was in the path of the next storm and fearing another story of those who lost everything, including their lives.

It was not two hours after the Moore tornadoes that I received my first out of state call from masons asking what they could do to help. Our Grand Lodge office and the Masonic Charity Foundation were inundated with calls from those ready to come help or provide whatever we needed. You cannot know how thankful we should be for the dedication of our Grand Lodge and the Masonic Charity Foundation staffs for their efforts. If you see them - thank them! They immediately created special website pages for those who wanted to donate and provided contact information for those wanting to help. Moore lodge itself kept an updated webpage with information on needs and contacts for those in the immediate area.

After the fifth or sixth Grand Lodge communicated with me, I felt it necessary to contact the Masonic Service Association in Washington, DC to consolidate and put out a national appeal for assistance. Grand Lodges know how to work with the MSA, and they provide a single point of contact for donations: to date we have received \$165,000 from the MSA. You should be proud to have not only PGM Lanny Sander serving on the board of the Masonic Service Association but also our State Representative PGM Randy Rogers for their service with that organization.

And monies continue to flow in. Lodges and brothers donated thousands of additional dollars, bringing total donations to more than \$300,000.

Within a month of the disaster more than 20 Master Masons, their families and Order of the Eastern Star members received immediate \$1000 direct grants. And there is a Promises Matter Tornado Relief grant application for those who need additional assistance. (see www. mcfok.org for information).

You should be proud of the caring shown by your brothers. If perhaps you

or a masonic widow or OES member suffered during the May tornadoes and have not contacted the Charity Foundation or your local lodge – please do so!

This type of disaster also shows where improvements can be made in disaster planning. How do we contact masons in areas when there has been a disaster? Do we have good addresses and phone numbers for masonic widows? How do we handle brothers from out of state who want to come and 'lend a hand'? When should events be cancelled in the case of a possible severe weather outbreak?

By working together, we will come through these events with a stronger masonic bond. The loss of life and devastation were heartbreaking, and I thank you for your thoughts, prayers, and assistance during that trying time.

On May 31st John Logan, Executive Director of our Masonic Charity Foundation, informed me the final tally of funds from the OETA drive this spring shows we raised \$55,476! This amount is the highest donation total since we began our relationship in 1996. Thank you all!

I had the opportunity to attend a Masonic Widow's Night and 50-year pin presentation at Kingfisher lodge #52. They had seven widows attend the dinner and short program, during which the lodge presented each with a Widow's

pin and card. I was heartened to see a lodge care for its widows and know that we can all do a better job of staying in touch with them. Their husbands joined masonry knowing that we all pledged to support their widows; let us not now forget that pledge.

Apache Lodge #223 placed a very nice "Happy Father's Day" ad in their local paper. In the ad, they spoke to fathers about their role in their family. A very nice way to say thank you, and also to raise the visibility of the local lodge. Great Job!

In January, I asked the Worshipful Masters of each lodge in Oklahoma for three goals for their year and asked you to make some personal goals. With the year half-way complete – how are you progressing with those goals? How is your lodge doing? Next time you attend lodge, ask your Worshipful Master what you can do to help your lodge meet its goals.

Looking ahead I have designated September as Blue Lodge Reunion Month. Take the opportunity to visit your local lodge. I hope that each lodge will organize a homecoming. You don't need to try and remember passwords, or be

'AH-SHAH-SHE LODGE #110 IN PAWHUSKA, **OK**, has been making major renovations to their Lodge building. One of Oklahoma's historic Lodges, the 1906 structure had served well, but was in need of help. The Brethren removed what furniture they could and built plywood boxes around the rest to protect it. The ceiling beams had cracked, and new, specially-engineered steel beams were created to support the structure. A crane, mounted outside, lowered a cable through holes cut in the roof to slowly raise the beams into position. More work remains to be done, but all Oklahoma can be proud of the Brethren and the effort they are making.

## From the Grand Secretary

#### **Preserving our History**

ny time you visit a lodge, you can find the Past Master's pictures hanging on the wall. Just looking at the picture gives you some idea of the fashion of the time, and looking at the name sometimes gives you a 'hint' of some legacy within the lodge or town.

Anyone who wants to know more about the Masonic history of these brothers can call Grand Lodge to find out when they were initiated, passed and raised, what other offices they held or what other lodges they belong to. But beyond that, what do you know?

Try this experiment. Go to the wall of pictures and start with the most recent W∴M∴ and name his occupation. Then continue working your way backward as far as you can go. Did you make it to five Past Masters? Ten? Twenty?

Each of our lodges has an elder who remembers more Past Masters than most of us will ever know. They knew many of these men well back into the past century and they can regale you with stories that are both touching and humorous. But once they are gone, no one will remember.

It is important that we start recording and preserving the stories and memories of our lodges. It can be as simple as creating a list of Past Masters and putting their professional occupation beside their name. You can include wife's name and children if you are really good at that level of information. As simple as this list may be, it can be invaluable when you are putting together a centennial program for your lodge or just trying to make your members a little smarter about who came before them. You may be amazed at the number of judges, doctors, professors, architects, truly learned men, who have passed through your lodge doors. You may also discover a farmer or rancher who, through their creativity, did something that was passed down through their profession for years as well.

The next stage is to have one of your older members do an oral/video history of the Past Masters as far back as they can go. At Frontier Lodge, we had our oldest brother sit down and recount all the stories he knew about the Past Masters of the lodge while we videorecorded him. It was amazing how far back he went, and how funny some of his stories were. Sadly, he passed away a few months later. But we have him, and his memories, recorded.

The ultimate step for recording lodge history is to sit down with your elder brothers and just have them record their own memories and stories about the lodge. There is nothing like a first-hand account of what happened when and

to whom when you are trying to learn more about your lodge than to ask someone who was there. The 70s and 80s may seem like last week to some of us, but to a growing number of our members, that is ancient history!

As our nation becomes more nomadic, moving to the far corners of the country, the odds of having lodge brothers stay in one lodge for a life-time decrease significantly. Capture memories while you can, because you never know when the opportunity is lost.

## From the Senior Grand Warden

#### TRUTH

English is an amazing language. It is how we communicate with each other in our daily lives, our business arrangements, our formal interactions, and our political discussions. It is how our parents and grandparents spoke, the method of communication George Washington and Benjamin Franklin used, and so many others in earlier times. It is the language Masons have used from time immemorial. But, it is also amazing how many times a word can be misunderstood when using this "simple" language. How easily it is to hear one thing and think another.

In the Entered Apprentice Degree, we learn that one of the tenets of our profession is Truth. We are told in the Third Section Lecture that Truth is the foundation of every virtue and the first thing we are taught in Masonry. But, what is "truth"? A book I recently read,

"A Treasury of Truth and Wisdom" by Frederick Slicker, states that "Truth is factual, objective and provable." Well, that sounds good and reasonable and fits in pretty well with the EA lecture. Further on in the EA lecture, we are told that "To be good and true is the first lesson we are taught in Masonry". Being factual, objective and provable sound like good traits, they don't really seem to be primary in my vision of Masonry. So I suggest we look a little closer at the word "Truth".

Many times I am asked what a particular word in our ritual means. How does it apply to the degree being presented? Usually the brother and I look the word up in a dictionary and try to see how the definition fits with the meaning of the degree or lecture. But, as we all know, many of our words have changed in usage over the years. What a word infers now usually is not what it inferred

a hundred years ago. "Truth" today usually makes us think of something as being the fact, an actuality, a reality, the state of being the case. However, "truth" or "true" comes from an Old English word relating to "faithful". With this thought of "true", the phrase in the lecture now becomes:

"To be good and faithful is the first lesson we are taught in Masonry" This is a much better thought as to what the

# ORDER OF THE SACRED WHITE BUFFALO

The annual POW-WOW for the Order of the Sacred White Buffalo will be held at the Grand Lodge Building in Guthrie on Saturday, August 10, 2013.

The Degree is always conferred by our own World Renowned Oklahoma Masonic Indian Degree Team in full Native American dress. It is a most impressive sight to behold.

The Order of the Sacred White Buffalo is an organization with two purposes: to recognize and honor the importance of the Native American tradition in Oklahoma Freemasonry, and to support the Grand Lodge Endowed Building Fund. The White Buffalo is a symbol of special significance to our Native American Brethren. It was a symbol of deliverance in time of need--of the special connection between man and nature.

To be eligible for membership, the applicant must be a Master Mason, a

member of a Master Mason's family, or a member of an Affiliated, Appendant, or Other Masonic Body in good standing. The Initiation Fee of \$100 and 1st year's dues of \$50 (\$150 total) must accompany the application. Dues are \$50 annually. Both husband and wife and children over 14 years of age may join.

Perpetual Memberships are available after you complete your degree for \$500 (10 X \$50 dues). This is another good way for us to support Oklahoma Masonry and maintain our beautiful Grand Lodge building which houses a big part of our history.

Memorial Memberships are available for a one-time cost of \$50. It is a good way to honor deceased brethren or their spouses. A certificate will be sent to the person purchasing the Memorial Membership which may be displayed in the lodge or given to the brother's family.



Registration will start at 11:00 AM with a meal at noon. The charge for the meal for members will be \$10. The degree will start at 1:15 PM. Dress is casual, but please no shorts. Applications should be sent to the Grand Lodge ASAP; however, walk-ins will be accepted. (Meals may not be available without prior registration.)

### From the Grand Treasurer

he year 2013 has brought new challenges to the Masonic Fraternity and the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma. The Boards of Trustees have been notified that several of

our Masonic brethren and their families have suffered substantially from our spring tornado throughout the mid part of our State. It is so gratifying to be part of a fraternity that has contributed to the relief of these families from our Brethren, the Masonic Charity Foundation, the Masonic Service Association and many of the Lodge members that have joined Oklahoma in reaching out,

that hand of Masonic fellowship to a brother in need.

The Boards of Trustees continually review the Investments of the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma. Though the first seven months, the overall revenue is 115 % of budgeted income through May 31,2013. Our expenses for the same period are operating at 80.6 % of budgeted expenses. The monthly income and expense are amortized over the 12 months of operation and to date is well within the guidelines of the approved Budget. The Perpetual Endowed Membership fund has more than \$6,000,000 in NAFA Capitol Market account in GNMA Bond Funds. Currently these PEM Endowed funds are earning 8.0 % interest, which is less than in 2012, due to the current U.S. Economy. The question continually comes up, it this still

a good investment? My answer is Yes! You cannot earn this high of interest anywhere else and it is an investment in the future of your Lodge.

At this time of year when we celebrate our Nation's Independence and Freedom from oppression, we are reminded of President Lincoln's address at the battlefield of Gettysburg, Pennsylvania that in part said -- that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom

May God continue to Bless this beautiful Nation.
